THAT WAS THE NEWSPAPER HEADLINE **ON THE DAY** THAT INTERVAL HOUSE OPENED.

It's hard to believe, isn't it? People didn't understand what 'violence against women' meant. They chose not to see how it tears apart families and destroys lives.

But you saw it - and you stood up. You joined a movement that builds women up instead of holding them down.

More than forty years after that headline, you've kept the movement going strong. Each woman who comes here feels your kindness and love. They know in their bones that you believe in **them** – even when they don't believe in themselves.

This year, that belief helped 77 families, including 53 moms, escape violence and start anew.

Because of you, women get the tools for success - so much so that other shelters take their cues from Interval House. In 2015, **39 women** graduated from that in mind. **Think about** our employment program. You funded 4 life skills workshops on topics like financial literacy and tenant rights.

Our programs are trail-blazing, just like you. You're not just setting the bar. You're raising it.

We're inspired by that. Our team is constantly looking inwards, evaluating, seeking out and filling gaps. We see it as a responsibility to improve and innovate. We can only do that because we have supporters like you, who see why it matters.

There's more to a fresh start than meets the eye.


Arriving at the shelter is the first women through the processes step for many. Interval House families are re-building from the ground up. But with the right tools, these women take control of their life.

Your kindness fuels that transformation by providing women with the services they need, when they need them through the Women's Program.

This year, Interval House families spoke 29 different languages, so cultural interpreters helped replace confusion with confidence. Parenting workshops helped moms relearn how to parent outside of abuse. Court Support guided

This year saw several high-profile cases of violence against women. They brought to light something that you knew, but many try to forget:

door. It's impossible not to find yourself grinning too.

Building on her strong new foundation, the BESS program helps women unearth the skills and abilities they already have. They're always far more talented and capable than they realize. In 2015, BESS women wrote 58 resumes, and dreamed big with **39 vision boards**. And most importantly, 69% of BESS graduates found stable jobs.

You see a change in a woman after BESS. She stands a little taller. Her eyes are a little brighter.

In the end, that hard work pays off when a woman realizes how strong she is. And it's the caring vou showed when she was at her most vulnerable, that helped her take the first step.

Women who stay in the shelter sometimes reconnect with us after they move on. This year, we spoke with Claire, who told us about how far she'd come since her first night at Interval House.

Claire was new to the city, and a single mom to two young girls. She wanted to give her children a male role model who would provide for them, a man who would be much like her very own father.

Instead Claire found herself trapped in an abusive relationship. Late in the evening, when he would leave for the night shift, her little girls would find her in tears. They would ask "Why are you crying, Mommy? Why are you so sad?" They never saw the abuse, but still – **they knew**.

She wanted to leave. But she had two children to look after, and no family nearby – where could she go? What would happen to her and her girls?

Finally though, enough was enough. When her ex threatened to hurt them, **Claire packed up her daughters and fled to a shelter** where they knew they'd be safe: Interval House.

Claire remembers crying so much on that first night, and in the days that followed, but never out of sadness. She was overwhelmed by the warmth and generosity she was received with. **She had almost forgotten that there was kindness left in the world**.

There were struggles, but there also was help. **The women and children there became her big, new family**. Together, they cooked, cared for the little ones, and healed. When she was ready, Interval House helped Claire apply for college. **She even won a prestigious scholarship to help pay for the tuition!** Then, taking her independence another step further, Interval House worked with Claire to apply for affordable housing. Thanks to donors like you, she even received necessities – from bed sheets to a toaster – to help her get established in her new home.

Today, Claire has a job she loves in finance, thanks to an education she'd never dreamed possible. Her girls are on the path to becoming strong young women. **This is all because your kindness made it a reality**. Because of you, women like Claire can rebuild a new life, free from violence and filled with hope.

Stories like Claire's are inspiring. They're also frightening. It can be hard to hear or even think about some of the struggles Interval House families have experienced.

Sadly, we know these stories not unique. But your gifts have helped these women to build their own happy ending. And there is more good news: the average age of children at Interval House is decreasing. That means women are leaving sooner, and giving their kids a better chance to break the cycle of violence. "It's like a castle from a fairy tale!"

A little girl described Interval House that way once. That speaks volumes, doesn't it?

When you think of a castle, you think of unbreakable stone walls. A moat and drawbridge keeping out monsters. Soldiers and horses and catapults, ready to defend.

It may look different to you, but that's what **94 children** found this year at Interval House.

Piece by piece, they took off their armour. They didn't need to protect themselves or their moms anymore. With a village of friends like you, kids know they're safe. And with the guidance of our Children's Program, they begin to heal.

They work through their feelings with Interval House's counsellors. They spend time with our Male Facilitator, Fred, who shows them that men don't have to be scary. Children find healthier ways to express themselves. They used more than **42 paintbrushes** and **15 pads of construction paper** in the Art Program. They had animated conversations with the aquarium fish. They played on **7 drums for our drum circle**. They get to play with other kids who just 'get it.'

They learn that what happened was not their fault.

You helped us organize **38 family outings** in 2015 to revitalize strained bonds between moms and children. The joy and relief in a mother's eyes as she watches her child laugh and play are deeply moving. We're careful to keep those activities low-cost and local, like trips to Riverdale Farm, because they often become family traditions.

When they feel safe and loved, children at Interval House take the steps to move forward from abuse. Stone by stone, your support has built the castle that gives them that security to just be kids again. For a lot of the children who stay at the shelter, the world feels a little less magical. Many have witnessed or even experienced abuse themselves. They feel scared, or angry, and it's hard.

Part of helping little ones to heal is helping them find the magic again – and you might be surprised by how quickly it returns. **They read**, **they play dress-up**, **and their imaginations run wild**. This year, we even kept some caterpillars until they turned into butterflies!

This year, Stefania shared her memories of Interval House. She's come a long way from the teenage girl who lived with us years ago.

Stefania spent her childhood with her grandparents in British Columbia. They owned an orchard, and she loved scrambling up trees and crunching fresh apples in the sunshine.

Then, after years apart, her mother called. She had decided to bring Stefania to live in Toronto. They would be a family – Stefania, her mom, her stepfather, and her baby brother.

But her stepfather abused her mother, beating her and locking her in her room. No matter how bad it got, **her mother was too terrified to leave** – scared of being alone with two children, and no help. One day he hit Stefania's mother with a glass ashtray. Stefania decided it had to end. **She called 9-1-1.**

The police brought Stefania, her mother and her brother to Interval House. It was strange, living with other families. At first, they couldn't even leave the shelter because of her stepfather's threats. But little by little, Stefania talked with other kids who had experienced abuse, like she had. A counsellor helped her work through the trauma. **Unbreakable bonds began to form**.

Stefania and her family stayed at Interval House for more than two years. Two birthdays. Two Christmases. **They were safe there, and happy, and healing**. When they were ready, they moved next door to another family from the shelter

Today, Interval House is still a force in Stefania's life. She has two beautiful children with a wonderful man. Occasionally, she sees her friends from the shelter. **And she knows that her story could have had a much different ending**.

Thanks to you, women like Stefania's mom have a place to go, and a helping hand. And their children – like Stefania – can grow up and break the cycle of violence **for good**. newly decorated

Children of all ages stay at Interval House, from newborn babies born right in the shelter to teens who have been living with abuse all their lives. They're all unique, but we have the same goal for all of them: **to give them the tools to break the cycle of violence, and move on**. Your gifts make that possible. Her world has turned upside down. But our supporters - 33 corporate partners, 43 volunteers, 35 volunteer groups, 12 employer partnerships, and thousands of amazing donors- help a woman to right it.

Volunteer Group Spotlight: CIBC

This year, the folks at CIBC donated an amazing \$20,000 for the families at Interval House. And each time they visit us to volunteer, it's clear they've put in so much thought and effort.

One night, CIBC volunteers hosted a mini spa right in the shelter! They pampered the women with facials and manicures, and kept the kids busy with arts and crafts. We thought it was a brilliant and rejuvenating idea. Afterwards, everyone was just glowing.

These things might seem small, but the impact on the women and children is huge. It reminds them of the many people walking right beside them on this new path.

frpo THE FEDERATION OF RENTAL-HOUSING PROVIDERS OF ONTARIO

When a woman is ready to move on from Interval House, we all stand with her.

Federation of Rental-housing Providers of Ontario (FRPO) is the largest association in Ontario representing those who own, manage, build and finance residential rental properties. They are some of our strongest, proudest advocates who are key to ongoing support programs. And in 2015, they raised nearly \$70,000!

FRPO's generous members help women access affordable housing in the private market. They set rent based on income, so she never wonders where she and her kids will sleep. We call it Her Home Housing, but it's more than walls, floors and a roof. For 2 women in 2015, it's a home.

It's security, warmth, and comfort – all the things you give a woman at Interval House. And because of this support system that you're a part of, she gets to take them with her as she moves forward.

Together, we're forging ahead on a new path.

A woman who leaves an abusive When you give women the right home is walking in a whole new direction. But the next steps are just as challenging. Your support shows that you're walking alongside her, by getting her the help she needs.

At every step, you are a comforting hug.

You are a shoulder to lean on. You are a strong hand to hold.

You are a warm cup of tea. a soft blanket, a nightlight.

In 2015, we received 441 crisis calls. In those moments, you gave stability and strength when they were desperately needed.

And when the crisis was calmed, you were there to help pick up the pieces. You are helping women and their families get what they need to rebuild, rise up, and move forward.

We are so proud of all that we have accomplished this year. Together, we're working towards a world where Interval House doesn't need to exist.






