When Interval House first opened its doors in 1973, it was the first shelter for abused women and their children in North America. We began as a volunteer collective of determined feminists who saw a gap in services and set out to make a difference. But as times change, so must we.

In 2018, we transitioned to a more structured organizational approach—one that allows us to respond more quickly and be more nimble. It's vital in these fast-paced times. This new way of working also allows us to track outcomes more thoroughly and be even more

accountable to you—and the women we serve.

With you by our side in 2018, we undertook the biggest update to our residential space in over 12 years, renovating and refreshing our bedrooms, bathrooms, laundry room and common living area. The end result? A warmer, more comfortable home for women and children taking their first steps towards new beginnings.

You've supported innovation, as we continuously improve our transformative, specialized services. And you've contributed to wide-ranging impact, ensuring we use our expertise to better ourselves while also mentoring and advising all who are seeking to end violence against women.

As Canada's pioneering centre for women escaping abuse, we

play an important role in leading the conversation and mentoring allied organizations working to end intimate partner violence.

Our 45-year history means we know what works and what doesn't. We know what services and supports are needed and we're constantly challenging ourselves to do what we do even better so we can help more women live their best lives.

Randal's story

I was born to teenagers living in poverty. They met in Toronto after my mother immigrated to Canada from a volatile region of South America. While my father struggled with alcohol addiction, I was raised by my single mother. In the early 1970's, when I was 5 years old, we ended up at Interval House.

One of my earliest memories of being at the shelter was the warmth. We could close the door and leave the wind outside. When you can walk into a room and take off your jacket and actually enjoy some heat and some food, that's not a small thing. My basic needs were met, which was profoundly comforting. I had access to

activities, paper and crayons, other children to interact with, and adults who were not panicked and worried all the time. Interval House created a space that was nourishing and vital.

I am now 50 years old and the father of two bright, beautiful young adults. I have been a teacher for nearly 30 years. My early experiences at Interval House inform what I do and how I interact with people. In my professional work, I am a champion for improving access to education and encouraging cultural diversity.

The sense of empathy I carried into adulthood came from my childhood experiences at Interval House and I am so grateful.

Investing in infinite possibilities

Being in an abusive relationship can impact a person long after it ends. That's where Interval House's Building Economic Self-Sufficiency program (BESS) comes in. Made possible thanks to your generous gifts, BESS helps survivors find employment and housing while providing emotional support.

Economic self-sufficiency means nothing less than control of one's own destiny. It's a fine balance of safe, stable housing, employment, community support, and, importantly, a personal sense of purpose and well-being. BESS recognizes that women recovering from intimate partner violence can experience crises in all of these areas, often at the same time.

With the understanding that each woman's situation is unique, BESS

provides support and workshops in essential areas like housing, resume and interview skills, access to professional wardrobes, goal setting and counselling.

Thanks to your support, we work with each client where they are at, giving them the tools to build their own futures—tools that break down barriers, create employment and change the way survivors view themselves and what they are capable of.

How far can the possibilities reach? In 2018, your generosity helped BESS serve 192 women, many of them mothers. And when we empower a woman to succeed, generations after her will too. Supporting BESS is an investment in community with truly infinite returns.

Catherine's story

Thanks to you, Catherine isn't hiding anymore

I was a few months pregnant with my second child when my husband first physically abused me. I lived in constant fear of physical and emotional abuse. Every aspect of my life was under his control. When he threatened to have my amazing kids—my angels—taken away from me, I decided: I am not having this anymore!

The moment I came to Interval House, I felt like I could breathe again. A weight had been lifted off my chest and I could finally sleep and start thinking. Stress made me pre-diabetic, but my health improved. And there is a great change in my children: they are happy, thriving, and we are connected in a way we never could be before because we can now live in the moment. **Now my kids see their real mom. I'm not hiding anymore.**

The staff at Interval House kept me motivated. When I came here, I felt like my wings had been clipped. I was dragging my feet, but the staff gave me the push I needed. Now I am taking bridging courses in preparation for university. I have confidence in myself. I now feel ready to be the version of myself that I know I was born to be. Watch out world, here I come!




MICHELE GRANNEN


