The House Your Kindness Built

A look inside our home

Interval House's Residential Program is a family-style home where women and their children find safety and community as they heal and rebuild their lives. You make a difference in the lives of these women every day, and we're proud to welcome you on a tour of the safe haven your generosity provides.

Here's a look inside our warm and cozy home, which can house up to 30 women and children at any time.



The open Living Room is designed as an expression of the rest of the home: bright, welcoming and safe. Flowing from the kitchen and living room, the **Dining Room** is designed to bring everyone together for family-style meals.



Each of our **Bedrooms** is a sanctuary for a woman who needs rest and healing. These serene spaces are filled with essentials like comfortable beds, toiletries and baby supplies, as well as special touches like soft blankets and fresh flowers.



The **Kitchen** is truly the heart of our home. Recent renovations have created a modern space where residents take turns making meals for the entire household. Sharing favourite dishes from their various cultural backgrounds strengthens the sense of community among the women living at Interval House.



Our children's areas are warm and welcoming spaces for kids to play. The **Children's Playroom** for residents is filled with soft toys, children's artwork and educational materials, and the **BESS Childcare Room** offers a safe and inviting space for kids while their moms take part in the BESS program.





Downstairs are two **Clothing Boutiques**: one stocked with casual wear, and one for career attire. Our dedicated volunteers keep the spaces organized and up-to-date so families can easily access clothing as needed.



In our **BESS Classroom** and **Computer Lab**, our residents and women from the community take part in BESS programming. The space is designed to give women at any stage of their healing process access to practical skills training, life skills workshops, assistance finding employment and housing, and emotional support from counsellors.

Success through BESS:

Ana's Story

Your support gives survivors the skills and confidence to build the life they deserve.



As the plane landed, I thought, I made it to Canada. I'm safe now.

For the first time in my life, I was leaving Turkey – and my abuser – behind. I had found temporary work as a live-in nanny. But when my job ended, I wasn't sure what my options were. I just knew I could never go back.

I moved into a women's shelter and tried to figure out what to do next. That's when I learned about the BESS (Building Economic Self-Sufficiency) program at Interval House.

From the moment I walked in the door, BESS truly felt like family. The staff welcomed me warmly. They were so informed and connected me with so many resources. I knew I had found the right place to help me move forward in my life.

I took part in a vision board workshop, which helped me set goals for myself. Not only was it the creative outlet I needed to process my past trauma, it was eye-opening to see my ideas laid out. I was encouraged to continue the practice at home, and that prompted me to make goal-setting and planning a regular habit that has changed my life.

I'm proud of everything I've accomplished since connecting with BESS. I've earned my food handler certification and diplomas in international cuisines and catering. I'm reaching the goals I set for myself. I'm living the life I know I deserve.

When people ask me what BESS is all about, I don't have to think twice. I tell them it's an amazing and unique program that honours the journey of survivors like me while moving them forward to independence.

Your compassionate support creates a brighter future for Ana – and so many women like her. Thank you.

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My BESS family was there for me. Staff members kept in close contact, even throughout the pandemic. They stayed by my side through everything, like no one else ever had.

Loblaws and Toronto Police team up to fill hearts and shelves with Cram-A-Cruiser


Over the past year, Loblaws and the 55-Division of the Toronto Police came together to collect donations of non-perishable groceries for our Residential Program.

Cram-A-Cruiser is a food drive with the goal of filling a local police car parked in front of various Loblaws locations with donations of essential items such as beans, pasta, rice, grains, cereal, canned foods and personal hygiene products.

The response was outstanding. Community members bought either pre-filled donation bags when they shopped at participating Loblaws or donated their own items. We collected several months' worth of food and supplies!

How Interval House continues to boldly pave the way

Interval House is Canada's first women's shelter. Since 1973, we've been a place for safety.

All the while, we've also been a voice for change. Our pioneering spirit over the past 50 years, combined with your generosity has helped us develop innovative services aimed at breaking the cycle of abuse for good. Here's a look at some of them!

• In the 1980s, Interval House led the way by being the first shelter to start a **Children's Program**, and later the first to include men as counsellors in that program. Today, men are an integral part of the Children's Program team, modelling healthy relationships between genders.

For children who have experienced abuse, learning how to play and engage with

other kids is an important step on their road to healing. The Children's Program consists of unstructured play time, as well as group discussions, conflict resolution and grounding techniques.

The Building Economic Self-Sufficiency (BESS) program was created in 1998 when we saw a need for Interval House to offer more than just shelter and safety. To truly break the cycle of violence, women need financial security, safe and affordable housing, access to education and to believe in a brighter future.

That's where your continued support changes lives. BESS empowers women through counselling, life skills workshops, housing services and employment assistance.
BESS programs help set women

at all stages of their healing journey on the path to living independently and safely.

 The SafePet program was born when we learned that concern for the family pet is often a major factor in the decision to leave an abusive partner.

Looking for a way to remove this barrier, we partnered with veterinarians who confidentially ensure our resident's pets are cared for in an approved loving foster home.

Survivors can focus on healing and regaining their independence, knowing their pets are safe.

Capacity Building in Action

Your long standing support means we can innovate to reach as many survivors as possible, in the most effective way. We've never settled for maintaining the status quo.

Your investment in capacitybuilding turns new initiatives and pilot programs into success for women. This year, you put roofs over the heads of women in our BESS program.

The Rent Subsidy Pilot Project was created to address the need for affordable, sustainable housing for women fleeing intimate partner violence.

In our three-year pilot, clients were provided with a rental subsidy of \$1,000 per month for a year. In that time, every participant improved her financial stability, found employment and moved towards being able to afford private market rent.

The resounding success of the project means we are no longer in a pilot phase! We recently launched the Rent Subsidy Program which now offers one-year subsidies to 10 BESS clients each year for the next five years!

We're surrounded by an amazing community of caring people. Janice is a long-time donor who is inspired by the strength and perseverance of the women who find their way to Interval House.

Janice grew up in a family with a strong philanthropic spirit. She learned to give back in ways that touched her heart while making a tangible impact.

Tricon Residential is a rental housing company dedicated to providing an exceptional rental experience to every resident they serve. We're thrilled that Tricon has partnered with us to refer clients to affordable rental housing units among their developments in the City of Toronto.

Like Interval House, Tricon is committed to bettering the lives of the people who live in our community. The company understands that women recovering from intimate partner violence need safe and affordable places to live, and that housing is a basic need that goes far beyond just bricks and mortar – it also provides community, safety and opportunity.

"We believe that quality rental housing can unlock life's potential," says Sarah Hicks, Senior Director, Operations. "We want to provide safe havens where moms can raise their children, reintegrate into the workforce and build a strong and supportive community."

Tricon is offering 21 units to clients in our BESS program at a subsidized rate of either 40% or 80% Average Market Rent. The first set of these units will be available to our clients starting in Spring 2023.




