Changing Times, Changing Needs: **New Program Highlights**

Your continued support enabled us to find innovative ways to reach survivors of intimate partner violence this year. Here are some highlights from our new programming!



Virtual Counselling Services: Breaking Barriers

Your generosity is delivering free, province-wide counselling to survivors of intimate partner violence through our Virtual Counselling Services.

The program is growing and diversifying, giving women across Ontario access to crucial support to break free from the cycle of abuse. Through one-on-one virtual sessions and online resources, women who have experienced or are currently experiencing violence at home are receiving counselling tailored to meet their unique needs.

Financial Literacy Pilot Project: Empowering Independence

Thanks to your support, our Financial Literacy Pilot Project is thriving. It provides financial literacy knowledge and hands-on, skillsbased activities through workshops and one-on-one sessions covering a variety of topics like budgeting, credit counselling, investing, money management, fraud and saving.

The women are also connecting through peer-support circles, building a strong community as they work towards financial independence. The program is empowering survivors of intimate partner violence with the skills and confidence needed to accomplish their financial goals.

Rent Subsidy Program: Starting Strong

Interval House is committed to providing innovative housing initiatives to help women escaping intimate partner violence secure a safe, sustainable place to rebuild their lives. Donors like you help support programs like the Rent Subsidy Program, which offers 10 BESS clients a monthly subsidy of up to \$1,000 for one year.

Our housing services help survivors and their children find highquality apartments in welcoming communities, so they can have the chance to heal and rebuild their lives with dignity. For many, this is the first time they've felt safe in a place they can truly call home.

New Program Update: Virtual Counselling Services

Your Support Sends Hope Everywhere

Intimate partner violence (IPV) impacts thousands of women across Canada. But for those living in smaller or remote areas, access to specialized counselling is limited.

Now, your support is helping address this gap with our Virtual Counselling Services, our first province-wide initiative.

This program offers free, one-onone counselling to women who have experienced or are currently experiencing abuse. The virtual format opens access to women with disabilities and women living in rural or remote areas of Ontario. Sessions are tailored to the unique needs and experiences of each client. No matter what stage they are on their healing journey, survivors are in a safe and supportive environment where they can develop essential life skills, understand the cycle of abuse, and make informed decisions about their future. And perhaps more importantly, it breaks down the barriers that cause isolation.

They collaborate with their counsellor to create personalized plans, identifying areas where they need the most support.

Our online portal has various learning modules and E-books developed by Interval House. These resources foster a deeper engagement with the counselling process, and are designed for education and awareness and early intervention and prevention of IPV.

Together, we're eliminating barriers and empowering more women to find the skills and confidence needed to break free from the cycle of abuse. Thanks to you, hope lives in more communities today.

My Skills and Build a Life Filled with Hope.

I remember holding my perfect newborn, my mind filled with the questions many new parents have. Will I be a good mom? Will I make her proud?

But fear interrupted my thoughts. It's getting worse. I need to leave. How will I support us?

Adding to my worry was an upcoming psychological assessment. I imagined they would judge me as many others did: someone who lacked any real skills to build a brighter future.

Instead, the psychologist connected me with Interval House. I began attending support groups and skills programs. I discovered the healing power of therapy. My daughter and I were welcomed with so much love.

Slowly, I began to see what my Interval House community saw in me: a survivor escaping intimate partner violence. A bright university graduate. A courageous woman. A good mom.

My BESS employment counsellor, Fiona, spent time listening to my goals and helping me identify my strengths. I wanted to build a career in healthcare after starting out as a patient care assistant. Although I'd

studied finance many years ago, I didn't see how that was any use to me now.

Fiona pointed out that my education was an asset and there were opportunities within healthcare to apply my experience. I upgraded my skills with a Microsoft 365 course and Fiona helped me update my resume. For the first time in years, I felt confident.

I joined a home care team as a junior administrative assistant. I moved into the payroll department, and today I'm their newest executive administrative assistant.

I'm proud of that, but you know what really makes me feel like I've made it? Each time my daughter shouts, "That's my mommy!" when I pick her up from school each day. I know I'm making her proud, too.

When you support Interval House programs, you help women like me find hope. From the bottom of my heart, thank you.

Donor Spotlight Spreading the Love of Family


Nothing makes Stephen happier than getting together with his family.

He's proud that his three grown kids are still close. As the oldest of 12, Stephen knows what a lifelong gift it is to have a special sibling bond.

Growing up on a small Caribbean island, Stephen and his brothers and sisters were a tight-knit bunch. "We were just always together, all the time," he remembers. Being together often meant accompanying their father when he offered rides or took food to those who needed care.

Through difficult times, the family relied heavily on each other for support. To this day, Stephen is grateful for the close relationships he has with his siblings.

Like his own dad, Stephen has always looked for ways to pay it forward in his community. When he first heard about Interval House in



the late 1970's, he sent a donation, and he's continued his support ever since.

"It really got to me," he says, "the fact that we have mothers and children in our community who need a place to go."

Stephen attended his first Open House event at the shelter over 20 years ago. Seeing how deeply families are affected by intimate partner violence, showed him the true impact of his support.

As he toured the living spaces, one thought really hit home: Interval House keeps women and their children safe – surrounded by care and kindness – after experiencing violence.


Lesley: Our Financial Literacy Pilot Project is top of mind. Seeing its success has been amazing, and I'm excited to watch it grow with the support of our community.

Educating women about understanding their finances really is the key to empowering them towards independence.


